EYFS train journey

Our EYFS teams report: 'EYFS went on a train trip from Berkhamsted to Apsley and back. Donna, a member of staff, told the children all about her job. They children asked many questions about



what she does, the train station and the train. They were on the lookout for many things linked with their learning, including shapes, numbers and animals. The children had a checklist of items to tick off when they had seen them; including a time table, field, coffee shop and train tracks. We had to cross the platform over the bridge to get the return train to Berkhamsted. Once back in the station, Donna

stamped all of our tickets to say we had been on the train.'

Community News: Defibulator update

3 additional heart defibrillators have now been installed in the British Telecom phone boxes at Great Gaddesden and Gaddesden Row, and on the outside wall of the Red Lion Pub, Water End. These are all active should they need to be used. The device itself gives full instructions for use.

These units complement those already in place at the Buddhist monastery, St Margaret's and the Riding for the Disabled facility at Bridens Camp.

EYFS: Science Day Report

The children carried out some really exciting experiments including observing what happened when water was added to skittles. They were very excited, observing the way in which the colour came off the skittles and into the water creating a rainbow. We also created a 'volcano'! We added mentos to coke and watched the explosion. We had opportunities for fantastic use of scientific language throughout the day.

Y1 + Y2: Science Day Report

On Science Day, Year 1&2 went on an expedition to the Arctic! We had to design boats to get us there that would float using plasticine and luckily they did! Next, we thought about what clothes we would wear to keep us warm in the Arctic. We set up an experiment to test how well different materials kept water warm. We found that wool was the best insulator. We also thought about the foods we could eat while we were there and made some 'Permmican' survival food, which the children

thought was quite delicious.

Y3 + Y4: Science Day Report

In Year 3 and 4, we carried out an investigation to discover which paper aircraft stayed in the air for the longest period of time. The children created a helicopter, glider and plane. They then tried to fly them. They discovered that the aeroplane went the fastest and the helicopter stayed in the air the longest. Their investigation showed that this was due to the forces on the helicopter blades.

Y5 + Y6: Science Day Report

Year 5 and 6 welcomed Ben Sheath to our school on Science Day. Ben brought with him an artificial arm and all the children had the opportunity to withdraw 'blood' from the arm. This supported the children's learning about white and red blood cells.

The children then took swabs from their cheeks, water bottles and hands and grew cultures in petri dishes. A few days later, they were able to observe the grim results!
