Sports Premium

At our Curriculum & Standards Meeting we had a presentation from Mrs Todiresei who leads PE across the School. All Schools receive Sports Premium Funding as part of the London 2012 legacy to make "additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport". The Governors were hugely

impressed by the work that Mrs Todiresei has done to drive the quality and range of sporting opportunities across the school.

- The School actively seeks out partnerships with other local schools and clubs to increase the range of activities on offer. As part of the Dacorum School Sports Network, children have attended Sports Fayres and a Tag Rugby event. We have arranged for all junior children to have swimming lessons at Beechwood Park in the summer term. There is an inspiring range of after-school sporting clubs on offer (dodgeball, football, basketball, athletics, BMX, tennis) many run by outside professional coaches.
- We give children experience of more unusual sports ('WOW PE') and recent examples include BMX riding, Karate and Scootering. This might be the one time that having a playground on a hill is an advantage! The BMX teacher also gave an inspirational assembly to the children about following your dreams
- We also seek out opportunities for children to experience competitive sport, be that through the popular inter-house tournaments or through matches against other schools. A great example of this is the village football league which is organised by Mrs Todiresei.

I hope that the professional athletes who inspired us all in London 2012 would be delighted to see their legacy coming to life in our village school.
