<p>Wednesday 12th September</p>	<p>Focus: PSHE WALT: Share information about ourselves. Task: Create a poster to share information on your likes/dislikes as well as other information about yourself.</p> <p>WILF:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Honest reflection about your likes/dislikes. ➤ As much information as possible. ➤ Excellent presentation. <p>Additional Task: You must cover your homework book in <u>wrapping paper</u> to ensure that it looks neat and is protected for the year ahead.</p> <p>My Maths: Our Maths topics this half-term include: Number and place value, the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) Number Properties. <p>Wednesday 19th September</p>	<p>Focus: History WALT: Find out facts. Task: Below, you have been provided with a range of statements all relating to Ancient Greece. You must research each statement to find out if they are true or false. For each false statement, you will need to research the true fact relating to the original statement.</p> <p>*Ancient Greek pots were made of glass. *Soccers was a famous ancient Greek philosopher but he didn't seem to write much because there are no records.</p>

	<p>*Zeus was the King of the Gods. *The Ancient Greeks had only one Queen or King. *Greece is a country in Asia. *Some of our alphabet came from the alphabet the Ancient Greeks used. *The first Olympic games were held in 776. *Slaves made up about a quarter of the working population on Athens.</p> <p>Spelling: Please see your child's Look, Cover, Write, Check sheet to see their spelling score for this week. Write a fact file with information about your chosen God including a picture.</p> <p>WILF:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ At least five facts ➤ One drawing ➤ Organise information using a tile, bullet points, picture captions. <p>Spelling: Please see your child's Look, Cover, Write, Check sheet to see their spelling score for this week. Please ensure they spend time each day completing a column of this week's spelling words. This is an opportunity to practice letter formation and handwriting as well as spelling.</p> <p>My Maths: Our Maths topics this half-term include: Number and place value, the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) Number Properties. <p>Wednesday 3rd October</p>	<p>Focus: Science WALT: Describe features of planets in our solar system Task: Choose a planet in the solar system (not Earth) and design a poster encouraging people to visit it for a holiday (imagine that travelling to that planet is possible!)</p> <p>WILF:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Accurate information about that planet e.g how many moons it has, how many hours there are in a day ➤ Features of the planet described as a 'selling point' – why should people come to that planet? What will they be able to see and do? ➤ Drawings of your chosen planet using the correct colours and showing its ring (if it has some) <p>Spelling: Please see your child's Look, Cover, Write, Check sheet to see their spelling score for this week. <p>Wednesday 10th October</p>	<p>Focus: English</p> <p>WALT: Plan a story. Task: Your task this week is to plan a story that you will write next week. You will need to think about who your main character(s) will be, where your story is set, what will happen in the story (what is the problem your character faces?) and how they can solve the problem. You may wish to answer the 5 W questions (Who? What? Where? When? Why?) to help you. You can list adjectives and connectives that you will include in your story. You may wish to write down some ideas for similes, personification and metaphors that you can use too. Your story can be based on any genre, e.g. fairy tale, adventure, science fiction, etc.</p> <p>WILF:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Select a genre ➤ Answer the 5 W questions ➤ Draw a picture of your main character ➤ Label your character with words to describe their appearance and personality ➤ List 9 adjectives that you will use in your writing next week ➤ List 7 connectives that you will use in your writing next week ➤ Include at least 2 simile/metaphor/personification ➤ Plan out your beginning, problem, climax, resolution and ending using bullet points. <p>Spelling: Please see your child's Look, Cover, Write, Check sheet to see their spelling score for this week. <p>Wednesday 24th October</p>	<p>Focus: R.E.</p> <p>WALT: Think of those who are less fortunate than ourselves.</p> <p>Task: For your homework over half-term, we would like you to create a gift in the form of a shoe-box for the <i>Samaritan’s Purse Operation Christmas Child</i>. The idea is that you will be providing a present for a child somewhere else in the world, who is less fortunate than you. Your gift does not have to cost a lot of money – it is more about the thought that you put in.</p> <p>WILF:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ A shoe-box wrapped in colourful wrapping paper (lid and box wrapped separately). ➤ A label demonstrating whether the gift is for a boy or girl and the appropriate age category: 2 – 4, 5 – 9 or 10 – 14. ➤ Items that other children might like (dolls, stuffed toys, toy cars, yo-yos, skipping ropes, bouncy balls, small puzzles, pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, felt-tip pens, writing pads, notebooks, colouring books, solar calculators, hat, sunglasses, hair accessories, etc. Additionally, you could include hygiene items such as a toothbrush (and toothpaste), bars of wrapped soap, a comb or hairbrush or a flannel. Please do not include: used or damaged items; war related items such as toy guns, play soldiers or knives; chocolate or other food items, liquids or lotions or any type, including bubbles; medicines; sharp objects; glass containers; playing cards of the 4-suit variety. ➤ If you wish, you can include a photo of yourself and/or a note to the recipient of your gift. <p>My Maths: Our Maths topics this half-term include: Number and place value, the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) Number Properties.
